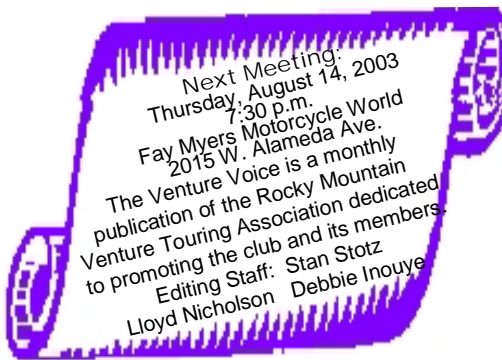
## Ruth Nicholson Funeral July 30, 2003

#### Bear Tooth Pass Ride

We left Thursday morning at 7:00 a.m. from the Gunther Toodies parking lot at 104<sup>th</sup> Avenue and I-25 headed north. We changed our planned route because we had gotten word about some pretty nasty road construction.
