

Passengers

Over the past couple of years while riding with two motorcycle clubs the Colorado Freewheelers & the RMVTA, I am always amazed at times at some of the things I view while riding at the back of the pack. You see these concerns more from the inexperienced riders as a rule, but once in a while from those "Macho Guys" who have thousands of miles on the road. I wonder at times, if they realize and are aware that they have a passenger on board with them. Have they taken the time to explain some of the basics of motorcycling? How to ride? What to wear? What is there comfort zone for a ride, or just get on and tough it out for four hundred miles? These are all good questions, and maybe we need to refresh or pass on a little information to new riders to the sport of motorcycling. It seems like every motorcycle publication I read these days touches on this a little bit. I know at times that even with all the miles that Dino has ridden with me, their are times when I am not too bright in regard to her needs as a passenger. Here are a few tips that have helped over the years.

First Time Passengers

If you have a first time passenger, and they know nothing about riding, they will gather all their information about riding motorcycles from you, the driver. You want to promote a positive impression of riding. To someone who has never been on a bike, impressions are everything.

Correct Gear? You're responsible for your passenger's safety. Make sure your passenger is wear the correct riding gear for the days ride ahead. Dress them like you would dress yourself.

What Not To Touch! Make sure your passenger knows a little about the machine before starting out on a ride. When is it OK to get on and off the machine? What parts of the machine could burn them? Things they need to avoid to enjoy the ride.

What to Expect? Most passengers have

seen motorcycles lean a thousand times while driving on the road behind a motorcycle. But the first thing they do on a motorcycle while riding as a new passenger is try to lean the motorcycle upright. Before starting that ride, explain how to relax and look over your inside shoulder going into turns.

Joy Ride, or Terror Ride? This would not be a great time too show off all your years of motorcycling experience, or your Evil Knievel moves. Chances are they will be nervous at that first ride, and even a sedate ride will feel exciting. Take it slow & easy. A four hundred mile ride the first time out will not be there idea of a good time.

A little debriefing goes a long way. At the end of the day, talk about the ride. If there is interest there they will let you know. Point out things about the ride, and how they handled themselves. Keep it upbeat.

Next month, we will touch on this some more. What about our long time and loyal passengers? The ones who have ridden thousands of miles with their drivers. A few tips on that, as I think at times we forget they are back there behind us. Until then, let's all have a great riding season. Be safe, be aware, and make the right choices.
